NATIONAL 4-H CONFERENCE & YOUTH LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

The application for and information about the <u>State 4-H Youth Leadership Council</u> and <u>National 4-H Conference</u> is open and available now! The Youth Council Application and National 4-H Conference Application will be combined again this year, with applicants indicating if they are applying for one or both opportunities. Any Kansas 4-H member between the ages of 14 and 18 before January 1, 2026, may apply as a Council Rep, and those 15-18 before January 1, 2026, may apply for the National 4-H Conference. This year's KYLF delegation will elect representatives from these four extension program areas (NE, NW, SE, SW) for one-year terms on the council. Up to 6 National Conference Delegates will be selected through an interview prior to KYLF, and they serve a two-year term on the council. The deadline will be October 1.

KANSAS 4-H LEADERSHIP WEEKEND

November 22-23 at Rock Springs 4-H Ranch and consists of the Kansas Youth Leadership Forum (KYLF) and the Kansas Volunteer Leader Forum (KFV). KYLF is for youth ages 14-18 before January 1, 2026, and KVF is for all Kansas 4-H Volunteers. KYLF will feature leadership workshops, Youth Council Elections, and opportunities to learn and have fun. The Kansas 4-H Volunteer Leader Forum will feature workshops and information to help volunteers be more effective and learn from each other. This Forum for adults is organized by the Kansas Association of 4-H Volunteers. Registration deadline is October 15, for both events. There will also be an option for coming in on Friday evening and having breakfast Saturday morning for those coming from a distance. INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE OPPORTUNITIES IN 2026

Kansas 12-18-year-olds, at the time of the exchanges in the summer of 2026, are eligible to participate in one-month exchanges beginning in June and July with accepted applicants from other states. Destinations include Costa Rica, Japan, Taiwan, South Korea, and Argentina. All exchanges include a homestay with a host family. Adults, 25 and over, may apply as chaperones for each of the groups. Kansas applications are due online by November 1 through the States' 4-H web-based application. The online application includes reference forms and photo requirements. WHAT 4-H FAMILIES NEED TO KNOW ABOUT 4-H PUBLICITY

As we begin the 2025–2026 4-H year, it's important to understand how publicity permissions are handled and how we, as Extension professionals, can responsibly share the stories and successes of you, our 4-H members. What Is the Publicity Release? When families enroll in 4-H Online, they are asked to agree (or not agree) to a publicity release. This release gives permission for the use of a member's name, image, and likeness by: Local Extension Units, Kansas State University (including the State 4-H Office), and The Kansas 4-H Foundation. This includes use in photos, videos, social media, websites, press releases, and more. If a family selects "I Do Not Agree," their child's name and image cannot be used. Some examples include: Kansas State Fair & County Fair entry cards, schedules, or results, local or state contests, social media posts, and news articles or promotional materials. Additional Consent Questions—To provide more clarity, families are asked to give specific permission for: first and last name, extension unit, 4-H club or town name, media (photos, video, audio, etc.), print-only media, social media, and county fair-related publicity. These responses override the general publicity release and help guide what can or cannot be shared publicly. These practices help protect youth privacy while still celebrating their achievements.

All new and returning 4-H members, 4-H Cloverbuds and 4-H volunteers must enroll annually in 4-H. Enroll here: Sign In (4honline.com) Please make sure all contact information including email addresses are accurate as this will be the information used to get important 4-H information to all members including the monthly 4-H newsletter. When enrolling please select "Pay By Check" to have your \$15 enrollment fee covered by the Phillips County 4-H Council or Rooks County 4-H Council depending on which county you are enrolling in. You must be enrolled by October 31 to get your enrollment fee paid for. DO NOT SELECT WAIVER WHEN ENROLLING! Those members that are interested in participating in the Shooting Sports project (Air Rifles) must be enrolled by November 1. Don't forget to enroll in the Leadership project if you are a 4-H member and age 12 by January 1.


